... and a bumpy train track with the rake.




Kim fetches boxes for houses and sticks for trees.

Now Kim fills a saucer with water. What a good lake!








Bulldozer



Red means "Stop and wait your turn," a lesson everyone must learn.




At the Railroad Crossing








BABYBUG is for babies who love to be read to—and for adults who love to read to them. Here are a few tips to help you get the most out of this "watch me go" issue of BABYBUG.

- **1. Kim and Carrots:** Sand and dirt, like other natural play materials, offer endless possibilities. In this story, Kim's play with a toy car on a loosely packed hill of sand sparks the creation of a whole system of highways and railroads, homes, and even a lake. While scooping, smoothing, and raking, Kim is also problem solving, experimenting, and learning.
- **2. Bulldozer:** Poetry often gives voice to life's meaningful experiences. And when you're a toddler, a meaningful experience might very well include the day you watched a rumbling, grumbling bulldozer. Let the hidden actor in you come forth when you read this poem to your child. You will never have a more enthralled audience.
- **3. On the Move:** As you can see from this story, toddlers love to take a spin on their own set of wheels! They're capable of using riding toys after they've learned to walk well. If you plan to purchase one, take your child along for a test drive so you can be sure the toy is the right height and won't tip over. And don't be surprised if your child moves backward on that first ride. Most do. Once they're headed the right way, toddlers rarely alternate their feet the way older children do. They zoom along by pushing with both feet together.
