


Kim and Carrots jump like the frog.




A turtle crawls slowly out of the pond.








Kim can crawl, too. What a funny turtle!







Bye-bye!






Six Snakes

BABYBUG is for babies who love to be read to—and for adults who love to read to them. Here are a few tips to help you get the most out of this "visit the pond" issue of BABYBUG.

- 1. Kim and Carrots: Like Kim, your toddler probably revels in observing and then trying out what he or she sees. As you read this story, encourage your child to have fun doing what Kim does—flying like a bird, hopping like a frog, and crawling like a turtle. Your little one may also be fond of imitating the actions of a family pet. Offering your pretend kitty a gentle pat and a bowl of imaginary milk can be the start of a favorite game.
- 2. Xavier's Feet: Water might just be the perfect toy. Clean, inexpensive, and readily available, it can be played with in many different ways and by many different

ages. Indoors, all it takes is a plastic dishpan of water, some towels, and a plastic smock or old raincoat for your child to wear. Outdoors, visit a puddle after a rain shower or fill a shallow wading pool with warm water. (Be sure to stay close to your child and empty the dishpan or pool when playtime is over.)

3. Six Snakes: Just watch your child's face light up when you invent funny rhymes or read and recite bits of verses like this one. Children's lives are enriched whenever adults share their delight in the rhythm, rhyme, and versatility of language.
