Mom's always saying that friends will come and go but family is forever. Well, if that's true, I could be in for a rough ride.





Believe me, the last person in the world I ever thought would get a girlfriend was ROWLEY.


I always thought I'D be the one in a relationship and Rowley would be the guy everyone kind of felt sorry for.




I guess I've got to give Rowley some credit for actually finding a girl who likes him. But I don't have to be HAPPY about it.


But now that there's a girl in the picture, things are TOTALLY different.




I was hoping this would've all blown over by now and things would be back to normal, but there's no sign of this ending anytime soon.

But I'M the one who's been best friends with Rowley


all these years, so if anyone has the right to change him, it's ME.

I wish I could give Rowley a piece of my mind, but I CAN'T because I'm depending on him to get me through the school year.




But if I have to start writing my OWN assignments, the handwriting on my homework won't be the same as before, and Mr. Blakely will know.

So I'm stuck with Rowley, at least until I can find someone who can write exactly like him and who also likes peanut butter crackers.







Ever since me and Rowley found out about Rebel's electric collar, we've been having some fun with him.





The other reason it stinks that Rowley isn't walking with me is because, with the school year winding down, the teachers have really been loading us up with homework lately.


That means I have to take almost all my books home with me every day.

My body's not built to carry that kind of weight, but Rowley is practically like a pack animal, so it's no problem for HIM.




Unfortunately, Rowley is just as willing to help Abigail with HER books, which makes me think the only reason she's even with him is to USE him.

Before a snowstorm, Mr. Sandoval always puts poles in the ground on either side of his driveway so the guy who plows it knows where the pavement is.


The last time it snowed, me and Rowley plucked the poles out of Mr. Sandoval's yard and started horsing around with them.



But I guess we didn't put the sticks back in exactly the right place, because when the guy came to plow Mr. Sandoval's driveway, he was off by about ten feet.








One time me and Rowley got too close to the woods and one of the Mingo kids came out to let us know.




I'm still not sure what he meant by that, but if Meckley's belt buckle was gonna be involved in any way, I didn't want to stick around to find out.

Well, I hope that's not true, because I think it's important for me to keep my childhood friends so that later on someone can appreciate how far I've come.




I'm not so sure Mom's qualified to give me friendship advice anyway, because guy friendships are TOTALLY different from girl friendships.

Anyway, in the Slumber Party Pals books these two friends are always getting into fights with each other about little stuff.




But after a while things always cool down and the girls learn the true meaning of friendship.

For example, let's say one guy breaks something that belongs to another guy, but it's totally an accident. Well, five seconds later everybody's moved on and things are pretty much back to normal.




I don't know if that means guys are less sophisticated than girls or whatever, but I DO know that the way we do things sure saves a lot of time and energy.



Nolan eats his fries, but he always lets the rest of us have whatever falls out into the bag. And I've seen kids practically come to blows over a few cold french fries.




We decided the only way to prevent someone from getting hurt was to split the fries up evenly, so we brought in Alex Aruda to divvy them and give everyone an equal number.

But no matter how many fries we get, it's never enough. Today there were only THREE fries in the bag, and we had to split them ten ways.


So you had a couple of kids paying Nolan a dime each just to smell the fries on his breath. And I think that's what made Abigail finally decide to look for another place to sit.




I feel pretty lucky I got a seat, because the people who didn't get one have to find a place to sit anywhere they can.

Even though I sit at a table with a bunch of guys, I wouldn't call any of them my actual FRIENDS. Because when we head outside for recess, we all go our separate ways.


I USED to hang out with Rowley during recess, but those days are over. It's probably time for me to strike out on my own, but the problem is, I don't know where I'm supposed to go.

First of all, there are some kids I have to watch out for on the playground.


A few years ago Mom invited a bunch of my classmates to my birthday party, but she thought I already had enough toys and she said so on the invitation.



Usually, when you open presents at your birthday party, all the other kids are jealous. But at MY party I think people just felt sorry for me.





They told us that we were gonna have to leave so they could play basketball.




I told Leon we could make a compromise and they could have one half of the court and we could ride our bikes on the other. But they didn't like THAT idea and gave us the boot.




I couldn't WAIT to graduate from the Superhero Training Academy and show Leon and his gang a thing or two.




Rowley's mom signed HIM up, too, and we were both pretty excited about it. But on the first day, I realized it was a total scam.



Aside from the kids I need to avoid, like Leon, there are a few different groups that hang out together at recess. But I don't think I really fit in with any of them.


There are some kids who play a fantasy card game, and another group that just hangs out and reads.

I'll tell you the group I WISH I could join, and that's the girls who hang out near the cafeteria door and gossip about everyone who walks by.


I've tried to slip into that group before, but it's pretty clear outsiders aren't welcome.

Every so often during Girls Chase Boys, somebody will yell out and flip the whole game.




It goes back and forth like that until the bell rings and it's time to go inside.




Cara reported me to the playground monitor, who made me sit against the wall for the rest of recess. I'm pretty sure the school called my PARENTS, too.


Mikey loves to drink grape juice, and I've never seen him without a juice ring around his lips. So he always looks like a forty-year-old man with a goatee.


The only thing Mikey and Manny do together is watch TV.

And even crazier than that, now GRANDPA has a girlfriend. I didn't even know you could still DATE once you got to be Grandpa's age, but I guess I was wrong.



Grandpa started dating this widow named


Darlene, and we met her this weekend when they

But what Mom DIDN'T mention is that her friend's son is a high school SENIOR, which made for a really awkward afternoon.




Lately Mom's been giving me tips on how to make new friends at school.


At school there's this big push to encourage "positive reinforcement," so they've started taking down all the anti-bullying posters in the hallways because they don't fit with the new theme.

If you get a certain number of Hero Points, you can turn them in for prizes like extra recess time.






Hero Points are printed on sheets of ten, and teachers tear one off when they want to reward a kid.



The teachers got suspicious when the worst kids in our class started turning in tons of Hero Points for extra recess.





I've done a lot of boring things in my life, but NOTHING saps my energy worse than back-toschool clothes shopping.






We must've been in there for three hours before Mom came back to get us.

It wasn't easy deciding which shoes to get, though. There are about a million different types, and each one is supposedly good for a specific thing.




There are shoes for hiking, shoes for running, shoes for skateboarding, and a bunch of other ones, too.

But I got nervous that if I bought those, I'd be totally out of control on the walk to school.




Then there was a pair of green "cross-training" shoes that really looked awesome, but on the box it said they were for the "serious athlete."


Plus, it gave me a chance to enjoy the new-shoe smell all the way home.

The way to school is like a minefield of mud and grease and other junk, and you practically have to be a ninja to avoid all of it.




In fact, after getting only one block from my house this morning, I turned around and went back inside. I got some of those plastic grocery bags to put my feet in, and for a while everything was good.








Eventually, I gave up and just walked in the grass. By the time I got to school, I was twenty minutes late, but it was totally worth it to show up in style.



Unfortunately, we were having a pop quiz in Geography, and I had to try and catch up to everyone else.


A few minutes into the quiz, I noticed a really terrible smell. At first I thought it was Bernard Barnson, who usually doesn't smell too good in general.

But I think Mrs. Pope thought I was trying to skip out on the pop quiz, because she gave me a plastic bag to put my shoe in and told me to return to my seat.


By now the rest of the kids had figured out what was going on, and everyone had a good laugh at my expense.

One of the police horses unloaded right on the main path where everybody was walking by, and the two of us spent the rest of the night watching people's reactions as they tried to avoid it.




Those were some good times, but I guess they're all over now.






Wednesday




A few houses down are the Lasky boys, but THEIR idea of a good time is stripping down to their underwear and wrestling in the front yard.



Unfortunately, Mom's always trying to set up a "playdate" between me and Fregley. She says she feels bad for him because he seems like a "lonely boy."



Luckily, Fregley is pretty skinny, so we were able to squeeze him in. The first thing I did was tell him how things worked, starting with the Five-Second Rule.




I was right in the middle of telling him how you can claim a piece of food that doesn't belong to you, when Fregley went for the potato chip in my hand with no warning.




I was pretty mad, and I told Fregley that if he was gonna pull that kind of nonsense, he could go back to his spot on the floor in the hallway.


I explained that somebody had to actually DROP something before it could be claimed. He seemed to get it and sort of tried to apologize, so I guess you'd have to call that progress.




While Fregley was eating lunch, I snuck a peek at his notebook to see how good his cursive was. But when I saw what was on the first page, I wished I hadn't.






So day one was a little bit of a disaster. But Fregley's gonna be a long-term project, and I'd better prepare myself for some bumps along the way.


Thursday




Fregley told me that when he was getting dressed he accidentally put his shirt on upside down and got stuck. That meant it was up to ME to untangle him.



At first I was a little irritated, but then I realized this was just the kind of thing other people might find FUNNY.


So at lunch I brought Fregley over to one of the girls' tables and had him do the thing with his

Fregley took off his shirt and put the gum in his belly button. I didn't know where this was going, so I took a few steps back. And then, no lie, he started CHEWING it.




I don't know if any of the girls were impressed, but I definitely was. Then Fregley said he was gonna blow a BUBBLE, which was something I HAD to see.

But I should've known it's not physically possible to blow a bubble with your belly button.





This just goes to show that no matter how nice you are to some people, they'll turn their back on you the second they get the chance.




Friday

I was TOTALLY blindsided by that news, and I could tell Dad felt the exact same way.




Mom NEVER tells us when her family is coming to visit, because she knows if she gives us too much advance warning, we'll make a run for it.

I'm sure most families have their issues, but it seems like when it comes to Mom's side, there's just a lot of extra drama.


Mom has four sisters, and they're so different from one another that it's kind of amazing they grew up under the same roof.

I guess she thought I was gonna break something, so the first thing she did was put everything that was fragile out of reach. Then she just stood there and watched me to make sure I didn't touch anything.





Aunt Cakey said she'd be downstairs in the laundry room ironing and she'd come wake me up in a few hours.


Then she turned out the light, but just before she shut the door, she said—






Aunt Cakey was in the family room watching television, and I had to go past her to get into the laundry room.




Once I was in, I pulled out the little stool Momuses to reach high places, and pressed my whole hand on the iron.










Dad wasn't too happy about the situation, because Aunt Gretchen had told us her rabbit was a BOY.

I can deal with Aunt Gretchen's pets, but her sons are a whole OTHER matter.


On that same visit, Malvin and Malcolm played a game of catch in our driveway with a rock or a piece of concrete or something.

Before you knew it, Mom had taken Malvin to the emergency room to get stitches in his forehead, and we were responsible for Malcolm.


While Mom was gone, Malcolm somehow managed to get ahold of Dad's shaving kit, and by the time we found him there was nothing anybody could do about it.





I know this firsthand because I stayed with her for two weeks a few summers back.




But I had a FEELING Mom would say something like that.


Whenever Dad leaves the newspaper out on the kitchen table, I always read my horoscope. But there's never any information in it I can actually USE.

Your lucky numbers are 1,2,4,5,7 & 126.



See, what I NEED is something that actually TELLS me what to do, so I don't have to guess. Up to this point, I've been making all my own decisions, and I'm not super happy with the results.




Wednesday

And I'm still not sure if it's because I went back to the same people too many times or because I doubled my prices.




But when Manny started selling HIS drawings, all of a sudden my relatives were like human ATM machines.





This all just goes to show that some people have no taste when it comes to art.




Thursday

Gramma bought Ellie as a chew toy for our old dog, Sweetie, who lives with her now.


But Sweetie tore off Ellie's trunk, ears, and legs on the first day he had it. So now you can't even tell it's supposed to be an elephant.

Every once in a while when we have dinner over at Gramma's, we try and have a little fun with Sweetie anyway.


One night we found out that if you sneak up behind him when he's sleeping and make a raspberry sound with your lips, his ears perk up.

After Easter brunch, all of us kids would go to Gramma's backyard and get ready to fill up our baskets with as many eggs as we could find.





But if that means no more visits from Aunt Gretchen and her kids, I have to say I'm all for it.




Sunday

On Christmas, the second you get home from church, you can just totally unwind.





Her cousin Gerald from California made the trip. Apparently, he lived with my family for a few months right after I was born, but I wish he didn't have to remind me every time he sees me.




Mom's cousin Martina was there, too, and she hasn't been to a family gathering since she struck it rich in Las Vegas.

The way I heard it, one morning Martina was at the hotel breakfast buffet when she noticed another room with more food in it.


But when she made a beeline for the other room, she found out there WAS no other room.

It was actually a full-length mirror reflecting the room she was already IN.




Martina broke her collarbone and sued the hotel, so I'm pretty sure the Porsche parked in Gramma's driveway was hers.


Uncle Larry was at Gramma's, too. I don't think he's actually related to anyone, but someone invited him to a family event at some point and he's been showing up ever since.




Uncle Larry's a great guy and all, but he always parks himself in the best seat in Gramma's family room and doesn't move until it's time to leave.






Uncle Larry was pointing at photos from the last Easter we all got together. In one picture Meemaw was wearing her diamond ring, and in the next, she WASN'T.




I guess everyone figured that if the ring was in an egg, then it was finders keepers. Mom tried to get everyone to come back inside to have dessert, but it was no use.

As far as I know, nobody actually found the ring. But when we drove away from Gramma's, a few people were still out there searching.




Tuesday

After Dad gave Aunt Gretchen and her sons the boot, they packed up and went to Gramma's.


And I'm sure that was just fine with them, because it meant they had more time to look for the egg.

No matter how much I inflated it at night, by morning I was lying flat on the ground.





The way you use the Magic 8 Ball is by asking it a question, then shaking it up and waiting for your answer to appear in a little window in the back.


I was curious to see if it actually WORKED, so I gave it a try. I thought up a question and concentrated real hard, then gave the Magic 8 Ball a good shake.



A few seconds later, this is what showed up in the little window—




I have to say, I was pretty impressed. But I needed to ask this thing a few more questions to make sure it was for real.



And every single time, it was right on the money.




Even when I tried to throw it for a loop, I got an answer that seemed pretty reasonable.

And that's exactly what THIS thing's gonna do for me.




In fact, after using the Magic 8 Ball for just one day, I don't know how I ever got by WITHOUT it.


Plus, sometimes when you REALLY need an answer from the Magic 8 Ball, it can totally leave you hanging.

So I hid out in Mom's closet, which I knew would be the LAST place she'd come looking for me.




While I was waiting Mom out in there, I noticed a bunch of books on the top shelf.

I flipped through a few of the books, and some were really eye-opening. I found one that was about using something called "reverse psychology."




The idea is that you can get your kids to do what you want by telling them to do the OPPOSITE.


Now that I think of it, Mom and Dad have been using that technique on us ever since I can remember.



When I was little, I used to BEG Mom and Dad to let me do the dishes, but they'd always tell me I was too young to help out.






There were books for just about every type of situation a parent might have to deal with while raising their kids. I've always wondered where Mom gets all her advice, and now I know.


When I was nine I found an inchworm crawling up our front steps, and I named him Squirm and kept him in a little jar with holes poked in the top.



Every day I'd let him out of the jar so he could get some exercise.




This was just about the time Manny was starting to take his first steps, which was unfortunate for Squirm the worm.




I was really torn up about it, and that night Mom came into my room to talk.



Well, today I found the EXACT place where Mom got that idea.




One of the books on Mom's shelf looked pretty new, and when I pulled it down a LOT of things started to make sense.



Mom's closet answered some other mysteries, too. When I was in kindergarten I had a stuffed animal called Tickles that I slept with every single night.




That summer we went away on vacation to the beach, and I took Tickles with me. But one afternoon when we came back to our hotel room, Tickles was GONE.




Mom said the cleaning lady must've scooped up Tickles when she took the sheets, so we went down to the place where they do the laundry to see if he was in the washer or something.




But he wasn't THERE, either. By this time I was pretty hysterical, so Mom told me I should make some signs, which we put up all over the hotel.




The next day we went to the beach, but I couldn't enjoy myself because of Tickles.




Dad played one of those carnival games and won me a stuffed animal to replace Tickles, but it wasn't the same.

Mom said Tickles must've found his way home because he loved me so much. And that's what I believed for a long time.




But hidden away behind Mom's books, there were FIVE stuffed monkeys that looked EXACTLY like Tickles.

Who even KNOWS which version of Tickles is sitting on the shelf in my closet right now.




So when me and Rodrick were doing the dishes tonight, I took a crack at using reverse psychology on Mom and Dad.

But right in the middle of a game, Aunt Veronica called on video chat.




The LAST thing I expected to see in the privacy of my bathroom was Aunt Veronica's FACE.

I fished the phone out of the toilet and did everything I could to get it to turn on, but it was no use.


I feel kind of bad for ruining it, but in my defense, I DID try to warn Mom and Dad I wasn't ready for that kind of responsibility.




Wednesday


That meant I needed to find something to kill time once school ended. There are a whole bunch of clubs for students, but I've never really been that interested until now.







Today I stayed after school to see if there was something that would be a good fit.


The Board Game Club sounded like it might be pretty fun, but it's run by Mr. Nern, and I've already spent enough time with him for one school year.




There's a Pillow-Fighting Club, too, but one look inside the room where they meet told me it wasn't really my thing.

I walked inside, and the staff looked like it was in the middle of a meeting.




I waited in the back until the meeting broke up, then walked up to the editor in chief, Betsy Buckles, and asked if I could join.


If I can avoid the Mingo kids AND get paid, that's a win-win.

I was trying to do my job taking pictures while ALSO being a full-time student, and that didn't make things any easier.








Whenever I see a picture in a yearbook or a magazine, there's always a little caption underneath.


So when I turned in my photos at the end of the day, I wrote little blurbs so Betsy would know what she was looking at.

Trevor Wilson leaves the bathroom without washing his hands.




The great thing about pictures nowadays is that everything is digital, so if you don't like something about a photo you took, you can always tweak it on the computer.

I figure every yearbook needs a little humor, so I edited a few pictures to make them funnier. Hopefully, Mr. Blakely won't be too mad when he sees his.







I realized being the yearbook photographer gives me a lot of POWER, too.


Monday

Over the weekend I got a chance to go back into Mom's closet, and I found my old Body Blankie behind her winter boots.




I couldn't BELIEVE it. I'd been looking for that thing for the past few months, and it was in Mom's closet all along.

After Phys Ed, the Body Blankie footies were filled with sweat, and I knew it was time to bail on the idea.




But when I tried to take the Body Blankie OFF, the zipper snapped.




Well, that might be true, but ever since Fregley ditched my textbooks, it's been a little hard for me to do my assignments.


THAT got my attention. I've heard rumors about summer school, and it's not something I really want to be a part of.

The classes are more like detention than school, and none of the regular teachers are there. In fact, I heard the English teacher for summer school is the JANITOR.



So when she called my name at the start of class, I stood right up and belted out the song we've been working on.




Mrs. Norton waited until I was finished, then she said she wasn't asking me to SING, she was just calling attendance.

I worked hard on it, and even turned in my project a day EARLY. But I left the box with the caterpillars on the heater in the Science classroom, and unfortunately that was the end of that.




Today during recess I was in the library trying to get ideas for my Science Fair project, and Betsy Buckles came in to say they needed me in the yearbook office.




She said the Class Favorites results were in, and she asked me to take pictures of the winners.

Best Dressed.




When Fregley walked through the door, I got confused. The only category I could see him winning was Class Clown, but I had just finished taking Jeffrey Laffley's picture.

I've had to do some unpleasant things in my life, but believe me, NOTHING compares to what I had to suffer through today.




After that I officially resigned as yearbook photographer and turned in my camera. Because really, there's only so much one person can take.


I ended up tossing it over Gramma's fence on the way home from school that day. But lately I've missed having it, because I've had some REALLY tricky decisions to make.

I finally caught up on my missing homework assignments, but my Science Fair project is due on Thursday, and I still don't even have an IDEA for it yet.




I was pretty desperate, though, so at recess I found Erick hanging out behind the school and told him about my situation.

There were old book reports and history papers, and a bunch of other stuff, too.


The person who seemed to be in charge was

Dennis Denard, who's in eighth grade but got


held back twice. I'm guessing he stayed in middle

So he put a potted flower in every place in the house where there was music.




The flowers all died within two weeks, and Rodrick thought the music killed them. But Mom told him the reason the plants died was because he never WATERED them.



I guess the school just dumps all the old Science Fair projects in the storage room, whether they got a decent grade or not.



Erick told me to turn my pockets inside out to PROVE it, but I noticed the door to the outside was open a crack and I bolted.




I'm not sure I'm ready to get involved with the Dennis Denards and Erick Glicks of the world anyway. Because once you take that first step, there's no turning back.

Apparently, it WORKED. But from what I heard, the way Rowley found out was kind of harsh.




But I can't spend a lot of time feeling sorry for Rowley, because I've got problems of my OWN.


The kids who got caught were given detention for the rest of the year, and I'm sure the punishment includes an automatic trip to summer school.



Mom said there was no use complaining, and that I needed to get started on typing up the report.


But I had already spent all my energy getting to THAT point, so I told Mom I was gonna go to sleep and wake up extra early to get the work done.

I set my alarm for 6:00, but when I woke up this morning it was 8:10. I totally freaked out because I didn't remember hitting the snooze bar even ONCE.




I knew I was in trouble because I had to leave for school in twenty minutes and there was no WAY I could type it up before then.

I went up to her room to thank her, but she was out cold.



I thought about going over and talking to him, but Mr. Nern beat me to it.




The more I thought about it, the more I realized me and Rowley are probably better off not being friends anyway. We've been going back and forth for so long that enough is enough already.

I couldn't decide what to do about Rowley, so I went to the one place where I knew I could get an answer.



It took a long time, but I finally found it near the woodpile.




I was ready to concentrate real hard and ask my question, but that's when I noticed something green and shiny poking out from under a log.

But I remembered what Mom said would happen if someone actually FOUND the ring. And even though I could probably sell it for good money, it's not worth breaking up the family over it.



Monday


The Magic 8 Ball might be good for helping out with the little decisions, but I figure the BIG ones are up to me.

So at lunch today I went to the back of the line where Rowley was sitting and asked him if he wanted to come sit with ME. And five seconds later it was just like old times.




I know Mom's always saying friends come and go and family is forever, and maybe that's true.
