



Obama played on the basketball team and did well in his classes.






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Hawaii had many multiracial (MULL-tee RAY-shul) families, but few African Americans.

He started to notice racism there.




Obama felt different from other students and wished his father was there to teach him about his African family.

When Obama was ten, his father


came to visit him from Kenya. Obama was excited

> to spend a whole month with his dad.




Obama's father visited Punahou School. He spoke to the class about Kenya. Obama was sad when he left. It was the last time he ever saw

his father.






He became a community organizer.


He helped poor people find homes

they could afford and register to vote.




In 1982, Obama's father died. Obama traveled to Kenya and met all his African relatives.



Obama is six feet one inch tall.




His father had been a leader there.

a lawyer. He applied to Harvard
University, where his father had
attended. He studied hard and
graduated with high honors.



Now Obama was ready to use his education. He wanted to help others be treated fairly. He moved back to Chicago to work as a civil rights lawyer. He also taught law classes to college students.

Obama dreamed of doing important things. He decided to run for the Illinois State Senate. He won the election in 1996. In 2004, he won the election for an even bigger job—U.S. senator.





Road to the Presidency

In 2004, Barack Obama was asked to give the main speech at the Democratic National Convention. This was an important event. He wrote the speech himself and became famous for it. His speech gave people hope for the future.



In His Own Words

"There is not a Black America and White America and Latino America and Asian America—there's the United States of America."



People wanted the government to change. Obama thought he could do that. So he decided to run for president. His campaign (kam-PANE) slogans were "Yes We Can" and "Change We Can Believe In."

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How could Obama win? He was just 47 years old, very young to be president. His campaign did not have a lot of money, and there had never been a black president before.

Obama didn't let this stop him. He used the Internet to organize volunteers and to raise money.

On Election Day in November, 2008, Barack Obama won!

He became the first AfricanAmerican president. The White
House was Obama's new home.

Obama is lefthanded.






