




George was born on February 22, 1732, on a farm in Virginia to a large family. He spent much of his time with his older brother


Lawrence.

called Mount Vernon. He was an army officer. George wanted to be just like him!






Teaching Himself


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When George was 11, his father died. He had to stop going to school to help at home. But George read a lot and taught himself. When he was 17, he got a job measuring land to make maps.



George was brave and strong. He was very good at riding horses. This helped him become a great soldier a few years later.

When George was just 23 years old, he was asked to lead the Virginia soldiers. This is a portrait of him in uniform.



Becoming, Becoming

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In the 1700s, America was not yet the United States of America. It began as just 13 colonies (COL-uh-neez) ruled by King George III in England.





King George III ruled England for 59 years! England is part of Great Britain. Wales and Scotland are also part of Great Britain.

People came on ships to live in America. They wanted more freedom than the king would give them in England.



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Many things were very different in the 1700s.



Home


Many colonists (COL-uh-nists) lived on farms and built most of their own houses and furniture. They used homemade candles to light their rooms.

Food

Most people grew their own vegetables, such as squash and peas. They hunted animals, such as deer and rabbits, for meat.








Chores and School

Children helped with farm chores. Most children did not go to school. They learned to read and write at home.



Sadly, when George was 20, his brother Lawrence died. Later, George became the owner of Mount Vernon.


In 1759, George married Martha Custis. They were happy together at Mount Vernon.







In the 1760s, there was trouble coming. King George III made the colonists pay extra money for tea and other supplies they needed. The colonists didn't think it was fair. They were angry.

The Revolutionary (rev-a-LOO-shuh-nair-ee) War started in 1775.

The British thought they would win.

They had more men and supplies.

American soldiers didn't have enough food or warm clothes.

But they would do almost anything for freedom.

In 1776, America's leaders signed the Declaration of Independence (dek-luh-RAY-shun of in-duh-PEN-dunce). It said America had a right to be free and to make its own rules. The British didn't agree. They sent more troops to fight.



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


B Cool Facts 5 About George




He had false teeth made from things like lead and ivory.

feet!


He liked cornmeal pancakes (called "hoecakes") with butter and honey for breakfast.

Very First President

How would this new country work? In 1787, men from each state came together to write new rules for the United States. They called these rules the Constitution (CONS-ta-TOO-shun).

Then, they had to choose a new leader. George Washington was elected (e-LEKT-ed) the first President of the United States in 1789. It was a big job to unite the new country.

After eight years as President, George gave up his power. He was happy to go home to Mount Vernon again. He had many visitors. He rode his horses every day.

In December 1799, George got sick with a bad sore throat. There was no medicine in his time to cure him. He was 67 years old when he died.


George Washington was greatly loved. He is the only President to have a state named after him.

the quarter, and a U.S. postage stamp.




Washington, D.C., America's capital city, is also named for George.

George Washington was the only President who did not live in the White House.







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
